# Let's Make A Plan!

For the presentation, you will need:

- ✓ One article
- ✓ Two expert sources

You are going to be doing a lot of **research.** Here are some guidelines and suggestions for how to obtain your <u>article</u> and <u>expert sources</u>.

#### € The article

- Search websites of newspapers and magazines (New York Times, Times Magazine, Seattle Times,
   Spokesman Review, Inlander, etc.)
- Search university/college websites (some universities publish articles). You will know if it is an
  educational website if it has .edu or .org at the end of the URL
- Wikipedia this is NOT acceptable as a source. Instead, use this website as a pre-search to give you
   ideas and other sources to look at for your research. Wikipedia is only a starting point.

## € Expert sources

- o The **student** expert
  - Talk to other **international students**! International students who have been taking college class are an excellent source! They have already experienced your subject, which makes them an expert ③

### The local expert

- Get to know the people of Spokane. Faculty and staff at SFCC who are not familiar with international students would be a good choice. They have a lot of information about Spokane and many other subjects that you or other international students do not know about your subject.
- Homestay parents are also an excellent resource.
- For the adventurous, find someone in the Spokane community that is connected to your subject.
- € How to collect your "expert advice"
  - o For each expert source you may communicate with your expert through:
    - Email
    - Facebook (Messages)
    - Audio recordings if you set up an interview, you need to record the interview and email the recording to Beth.
