SYLLABUS

I. COURSE TITLE: PM 540 Survey of Missions

II. COURSE DESCRIPTION: In this course the student will gain insight into the field of missions. This class will emphasize the biblical mandate for missions. The student will become cognizant of domestic, international and local opportunities for missions. The student will also develop a strategy for mission education in his/her church setting.

III. COURSE RATIONALE:

- A. PHILOSOPHICAL: The ministry student will be faced with a number of challenges involving missions in a local ministry setting. This course will focus on various approaches to missions with a specific focus on the methodologies of former missionaries.
- B. PRACTICAL: In addition to developing an understanding of the demands of missions, the student will clarify his or her personal approach to missions and ministry.

VII. COURSE METHOD:

- A. General Method: Class sessions will include the presentation of lecture material as video presentations. There will also be an opportunity to discuss relevant issues of missions on the online discussion forums. Work outside of class will focus on reading assignments and brief written responses to those reading assignments.
- B. Online Method: The uniqueness of distance learning necessitates unique learning experiences and methods. The power of an online course management system like Moodle makes unique assessment methods possible. As a result, this online course will follow the module schedule above. Grades will be given for the viewing of video sessions, the completion of written assignments, and exams. In each case, the deadline will be midnight on the last day of the module.

IX. COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

A. Video Lectures & Notes

- 1. All 20 video lectures by Dr. Calhoun are to be viewed, taking notes as you view.
- 2. A copy of your lecture notes will be submitted on the Moodle site.
- 3. The lecture notes for videos #1-10 will be due at the end of the fourth module.
- 4. The lecture notes for videos #11-20 will be due at the end of the eighth module

B. Class Discussions

- 1. Each module will include a discussion forum question posed by the instructor. Every student is required to post a response to the questions and to respond to at least one other student response.
- 2. Forum participation will be graded according to the quality of critical thinking and the correctness of language usage. A grade will be posted the week following the Module assignment.
- **C. Reading:** Each of the required texts will be read in their interiety, followed by a written book report.
 - 1. Each report is to be a minmum of 1,000 words.
 - 2. The reviews should include a summary of the book's content, a critique of the author's presentation, and an application to the student's desired ministry.
 - 3. Prepared according to Turabian's *A Manual for Writers of Term Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*, 6th ed. (copies in library).
 - 4. The report of the text by Peters will be due at the end of the third module.
 - 5. The report of the text by Piper will be due at the end of the seventh module.
- **D. Research Paper:** A paper on one of the missionaries discussed during sessions 11-20 will be written.
 - 1. The paper should include biographical data on the missionary and a discussion of the missionary's approach to missions.
 - 2. A minimum of six resources must be used with at least three coming from the internet.
 - 3. The paper will be a minimum of 2,000 words in length.
 - 4. The paper should be typed and double spaced, prepared according to Turabian's *A Manual for Writers of Term Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*, 7th ed.
 - 5. The research paper will be due at the end of the eighth module.
- **E. Reflection Paper:** Write an overview of the three missionary journeys of the Apostle Paul.
 - 1. Be sure to include successes and failures on the journeys. How did Paul approach his mission? What obstacles did he face? Where do you find evidence of his faith in Christ Jesus?
 - 2. The paper should be a minimum of 1,500 words in length, and follow Turabian guidelines.

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3. The Reflection Paper will be due at the end of the sixth module.

X. COURSE EVALUATION:

- **B.** Attendance & Late Grades: Regular, successful and punctual attendance is expected of all students enrolled.
