

# Student Support for the Initiative/Proposal

Since the beginning of October the students have conducted 2 surveys with OAL students and Alumni via email/survey monkey. Both had 60% or great response rates.

# APPENDIX A Outdoor Adventure Leadership Program Design

### OUTDOOR ADVENTURE LEADERSHIP B.S./B.A.

The mission of the outdoor adventure leadership (OAL) major is to develop visionary outdoor educational leaders who are prepared to be agents of change in the world, whether in a wilderness context or a context where these transferable skills are implemented.

The OAL program delivers an innovative, intensive and experiential curriculum that promotes the development of strong leaders capable of effectively managing a variety of outdoor experiences for a wide range of audiences and environments. The program is grounded in the theory and principles of recreation and outdoor leadership strategies and is rich with opportunity for application. Embedded within a liberal arts educational community, the program embraces the many opportunities to enrich each student's experience through interdisciplinary study and fosters in each student qualities of responsibility and independent thought, respect for others, the spirit of collaboration, awareness of our environmental and cultural connections and a commitment to lifelong service and learning.

### Special Academic Status Policy for Outdoor Adventure Leadership Majors

- 1. A student in this major must receive a semester grade of at least C- in all required RLS-prefix courses.
- 2. A student who fails to complete a required RLS-prefix course with a grade of at least C- must repeat the course. The Ithaca College policies on repeating courses must be followed.

  Repeating a Course
- 3. A student who receives less than a C- after repeating a required RLS-prefix course will be subject to dismissal from the program. A student dismissed from the program may be eligible to enter other Ithaca College degree programs.
- 4. A student dismissed from an internship is subject to receiving a failing grade and, in that case, must complete a prescribed program of remediation prior to a second placement. The student must register again for the internship. A student dismissed from an internship a second time is subject to dismissal from the program.
- 5. In exceptional cases, a student may be readmitted to the program upon satisfying conditions determined by the faculty.

At least 60 credits of liberal arts are required to graduate with a B.S. degree. At least 90 credits of liberal arts are required to graduate with a B.A. degree. All candidates for the B.S. or B.A. degree in outdoor adventure leadership must complete a minimum of 120 credits in the components described below.

### **Transfer from Other Schools at Ithaca College**

Each year the OAL program accepts a limited number of students from other departments at Ithaca College. Information and application forms are available online or in the Recreation and Leisure Studies office. Applications are reviewed each semester at a deadline stated on the internal transfer application, and a decision is made before registration for the next semester. One semester of final Ithaca College grades is required. Students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.5 to apply. Having the minimum cumulative GPA to apply for transfer to a degree program in the School of HSHP does not guarantee admission.

### **Minor requirement**

Students are required to complete a minor. They are encouraged to declare a minor early, as careful scheduling may be necessary to complete some minors. The minor can be in any department at Ithaca College. Generally, minors require 15-24 credits. Please review this catalog for a listing of available minors. Completing a double major meets this requirement.

### 100 days of leadership requirement

In an effort to increase the level of competence, training, application, professional development and experience of students, OAL students are required to complete a minimum of 100 days of leadership experience prior to a student entering their internship experience. **Students** must submit to the Internship Coordinator an OAL Field Log that chronicles their leadership experience. This requirement consists of students leading "face-to-face" adventure experiences.

### **Immersion Experiences**

The cost of participating in each immersion experience is equal to the cost of room and board for one semester at Ithaca College. This fee is attached as a course fee to the first course in the succession of each immersion experience.

### **Transportation Arrangements for Immersion Experiences**

During each immersion semester, students are responsible for making arrangements for transportation to and from the immersion experience destination within the parameters set by the lead faculty member.

### **Equipment Expenses**

The nature of the outdoor adventure leadership discipline requires that all students have consistent access to a basic set of outdoor equipment for safety and comfort. All entering students are required to acquire the necessary equipment needed to participate in the immersion experiences. Specifications about the required equipment will be provided to students upon admission to the major.

Integration of social-psychological theory of groups in outdoor adventure settings. Emphasis will be placed on group development, peer mediation, briefing/debriefing and transference. 2 credits.

### JOB SUMMARY:

Provide leadership in the delivery of opportunities for experiential learning, leadership development, and lifelong learning opportunities through The Center of Outdoor Adventure Leadership and Education for Outdoor Adventure Leadership majors (OAL) and Outdoor Pursuits (OP) minors. Oversee the development and management of program and curriculum development. Develop recruitment plans and strategies, maintain program budgets, curricular offerings and structure, and supervise students while in the field. Teach core undergraduate courses in the Outdoor Adventure Leadership major. Primary teaching assignments will include courses involved with the Immersion Semester Programs. The center is also responsible for delivering the courses Selected Topics: Adventure Skill Fundamentals, Selected Topics: Adventure Skill Fieldwork, and Selected Topics: Adventure Skill Management.

### SUPERVISION:

This position reports to the Dean of the School of Health Sciences and Human Performance or Chair of the Department of Recreation and Leisure Studies. The position will select as well as provide direction and guidance for the adjunct faculty of courses ran through the center as necessary. The position will also work in collaboration with other staff and faculty within the relevant departments as appropriate.

### **REPRESENTATIVE DUTIES:**

Duties may include, but are not limited to the following. Other duties may be assigned.

### **ESSENTIAL DUTIES:**

1. Administer the academic and administrative activities of The Center of Outdoor Adventure Leadership and Education, in cooperation with the Dean or chairs of related departments. Provide leadership in the development and delivery of opportunities for experiential learning, environmental stewardship, civic responsibility, and life long learning.

- 2. Develop effective enrollment and marketing plans for the program, and for the recruitment of students. Supervise the preparation of program promotional materials, including a program newsletter and other publications. Participate in the editing of the College catalog.
- **3.** Oversee the administrative operations of the program, develop and manage the operations and program budgets; authorize expenditures and ensure appropriate accounting and reconciliation of budgeted funds.
- **4.** Conduct academic program assessments; develop strategies and implement action plans; establish long- and short-range program goals and objectives to ensure overall effectiveness; prepare a variety of reports and analyses.
- 5. Oversee The Center of Outdoor Adventure Leadership and Education application and selection process; read, evaluate and make recommendations for selection into the program for OAL majors and OP minors. Develop and conduct orientation sessions to include preparation and presentation of program materials and information to students and parents. Ensure, through oversight or direct participation, a minimum of 2 campus information sessions each year and manage the orientation program each session.
- **6.** Oversee the development of the student affairs component of The Center of Outdoor Adventure Leadership and Education; manage; respond to emergencies and other situations occurring during regular and non-business hours; resolve safety and security issues involving Ithaca College students.
- 7. Review and manage curriculum for the program, including collaboration with on-campus faculty, departments, and schools, and the development of all OAL courses. Support the development of integrated curricular experiences between on-campus programs and The Center of Outdoor Adventure Leadership and Education. Manage the WEA accreditation process.
- **8.** Uphold the Risk Management policies of the college and the program. Work in collaboration with the appropriate offices to continuous refine the policies of the program. Meet annually with the OAL Risk Management committee to discuss occurrences within the program and trends within the profession.
- **9.** Manage staffing to include identifying adjunct faculty to assist with the program; arrange for appropriate faculty compensation and co-instructors, if needed, for courses run through the center.
- **10.** Manage the creation and delivery of skill endorsement programs run though the Division of Graduate and Professional Studies. Responsible for the course designations of RLS 180xx, RLS 190xx, and RLS 280xx. Additional pay will be provided as agreed upon through the DGPS.
- **11.**Create and maintain an ongoing interactive social/academic community for the student cohort each session to include special social events and academic experiences.

- **12.** Create and maintain an active relationship with the main campus through regular on-campus visits with administration, faculty, staff, students, departments and schools; create semesters/sessions with special academic and/or civic engagement theme(s); promote and coordinate these sessions with on-campus groups.
- **13.** Establish and maintain communication with students participating with The Center of Outdoor Adventure Leadership and Education. Provide personal and disciplinary counseling and serve as a mediator to provide resolution for interpersonal conflicts between students.
- **14.** Purchase and maintain all equipment needed to run the expedition based courses run through the Center. This includes inventory up keep and repair of items.

### **QUALIFICATIONS:**

Master's degree and a minimum of 5 years fulltime teaching experience and a minimum of 5 years fulltime administrative experience in an institution of higher education or equivalent professional experience; familiarity with program development and assessment; knowledge and experience working within Outdoor Adventure Leadership expedition based arenas; the ability to work with a diversity of individuals and groups across various departments and schools; ability to represent academic affairs effectively within and outside of the College community is required. Experience in the management of academic programs, experience in the development of new academic programs, previous success in student leadership, advising and mentoring. Must have and maintain appropriate certifications in emergency medical care, such as CPR, Wilderness First Responder. Instructor Level II status in the International Registry of Outdoor Leaders.

### PREFERED QUALIFICATIONS:

Leave No Trace Master Educator Instructor. Appropriate terminal status within the profession is preferred. Preference will also be given to candidates with certification(s) in various outdoor skills arenas.

### **WORK ENVIRONMENT:**

The work environment varies. Half of the work of the incumbent is carried out within an outdoor environment, while the courses are out in the field; 14 weeks or more are spent in a backcountry environment teaching each year. The other work is done within a generally accessible, safe indoor environment, at The Center of Outdoor Adventure Leadership and Education. The incumbent will be required to operate a personal computer, and associated equipment such as computer printers as well as other office equipment used in day-to-day operations. The incumbent will be required to understand the use of equipment used during expeditions offered through The Center of Outdoor Adventure Leadership and Education and make sure equipment is maintained properly.

- 9. Teach, and facilitate some classes, programs, events, and activities.
- 10. Maintain and repair the Center's technical equipment.
- 11. Other duties as assigned.

### QUALIFICATIONS:

Bachelor's Degree from a four-year Wilderness Education Association accredited university with a major in Recreation, Outdoor Leadership, Outdoor Education, Adventure Education, or related field; Two years of experience in adventure, outdoor, and/or environmental education program development and facilitation; knowledge and experience working within Outdoor Adventure Leadership expedition based arenas; the ability to work with a diversity of individuals and groups across various departments and schools; ability to represent academic affairs effectively within and outside of the College community is required; Must have and maintain appropriate certifications in emergency medical care, such as CPR, Wilderness First Responder. Instructor Level I status in the International Registry of Outdoor Leaders.

### PREFERED QUALIFICATIONS:

Previous experience with the OAL ISP program; Instructor Level II status in the International Registry of Outdoor Leaders; Leave No Trace Master Educator Instructor; Preference will also be given to candidates with certification(s) in various outdoor skills arenas.

### **WORK ENVIRONMENT:**

The work environment varies. Half of the work of the incumbent is carried out within an outdoor environment, while the courses are out in the field; up to 14 weeks are spent in the field teaching each year. The other work is done within a generally accessible, safe indoor environment, at The Center of Outdoor Education & Leadership. The incumbent will be required to operate a personal computer, and associated equipment such as computer printers as well as other office equipment used in day-to-day operations. The incumbent will be required to understand the use of equipment used during expeditions offered through the Center of Outdoor Education & Leadership and make sure equipment is maintained properly.
